I would like to begin by thanking Joyce Schafbuch for her strength and

leadership last year. I also send my admiration and thanks to all the other officers, committees, and interest group chairmen for the great job they did navigating us through the pandemic. I saw a lot of determination, grit, and creativity.

I would like to share with you the reason I chose this year's theme. Most of you have seen the quote, "Life is not about waiting for the storms to pass; it's about learning to dance in the rain." We have all faced many storms in our lives. This past year presented us with many storms-with COVID and the derecho leading the way. My biggest storm came when my late husband was diagnosed with aggressive cancer at the age of 53 and was told he had three months to live. He became paralyzed within a week of the diagnosis and underwent some very brutal treatments and surgeries to extend his life. He mentioned once while hospitalized in Mayo that he would like to visit the Grand Canyon should he live. Thanks to his treatments, he did continue to live. That was the start of our "Big Adventures" for the next eight years. Each summer after school was over, we packed our suitcases and his wheelchair for a long trip. We shared our travel highlights and health updates on a site called CarePages. At some point, our motto on CarePages became "Life is not about..." The motto represented our desire to get as much out of what time he had

left and the positive attitude he always had in his battle with cancer. I have been blessed with a second husband (some of you know him as pool boy!) who also has a positive attitude and desire to get everything he can out of life.

Our club has been through a tough year but here we are-still dancing! The ISUWC members I have been fortunate to meet and call friends all have positive attitudes and a desire to get as much as they can out of life. Let's use these qualities to have this year be one of our best.

Shortly before Paul died in 2014, we moved to Ames. I found myself not only a widow but someone who did not know many people in town. Donna Sogard saved the day by suggesting I join ISUWC. What a godsend this club has been to me. Let's all reach out to others that may need more in their lives too. Invite them to join this amazing club so that they may also benefit from the many things our club has to offer.

Linda Cunningham and Julie Larson have planned some fabulous programs for us this year. Check those out when you get your new yearbook.

The Fall Opener Committee and the Fall Trip Committee have both been hard at work planning for those events. Please note their articles. Our membership committee and yearbook committee have also done a great job again this year.

Gardening group maintained the community garden plot in Stuart Park.





Invite you to join them October 12, 2021 to Daytrip by Car to Scenic Iowa Falls



Due to the continuing Covid pandemic, the ISUWC Fall Trip will be scaled down to a short day and travel by passenger cars only. Members may travel to lowa Falls on their own, with a group organized by a driver or join a driver with open seating. The trip will only be open to fully vaccinated members and masking will be encouraged; individual drivers will have the option of requesting masks in their vehicle.

Participation will be limited to 50 members.

We'll meet at a TBA parking lot at 8:45 am and leave as a group at 9 am. Travel to lowa Falls will take approximately 1 hr. Upon arrival, travelers will have the option to peruse the charming lowa Falls downtown area or any of the museums. We will gather for a "Dutch treat" lunch at 11 am at the 502 Grille House located downtown. At 1 pm, we will board the Scenic City Empress Riverboat for the 1 hour 15 minute cruise on the scenic lowa River to enjoy the river scenery and fall colors. The Scenic City Empress is a comfortable double-decker pontoon boat with an open upper level and enclosed lower level. BYO beverages, including wine, which is an option for the river cruise. At the completion of the cruise, individuals or groups will be free to return to Ames at their discretion.

Cost—\$10 to cover the riverboat cruise. Payment reserves seat on the boat. Seat refund only if a replacement is found; otherwise, seat is non-refundable. Suggested \$3 gratuity for a driver by each rider. The committee reserves the right to CANCEL the trip if pandemic conditions warrant with a full refund.

Ananda Astrini Muhammad, Indonesia, Ph.D., Applied Linguistics & Technology


Ananda Astrini Muhammad journey at Iowa State began when she was selected as a Fulbright student by the U.S. Department of State, which allowed her to immerse herself in the U.S. academic community as well as its culture. Seizing the opportunity to remain at Iowa State to pursue her Ph.D., Ananda has been fortunate to be taught and mentored by strong female scholars in her field. Observing and collaborating with them, she has submitted to and participated in over 20 refeed publications and invited academic presentations.

The male faculty at Iowa State have also never failed to motivate Ananda in her research. Her major professor is the primary influence, and he encouraged and convinced Ananda that having experience in the language assessment industry following graduation will

bridge the gap between theory and practice.

As a Fulbright Scholarship recipient, Ananda was involved in various cultural exchange events such as the Cultural Diversity and International Friendship Fairs where she educated the audience on her culture and enthusiastically answered questions about her country. During summers in Ames, she tutors elementary school children in reading so that they continue to develop their reading skills

Ananda states that "In my academic works, I strive to conduct and disseminate research that places ISU at the forefront of language assessment research. My leadership work serves as a testament to my dedication to not only develop myself, but also others in the process."



Erica Nicole Moscoso, Mission Viejo, CA, DVM, Doctor of Veterinary Medicine

Erica Nicole Moscoso earned her undergraduate degree from Utah State University where she was a Division 1 student athlete playing volleyball. Attending on a full-ride scholarship, Erica learned about crucial leadership and team building skills, and dedicated her time and skills to things larger than herself.

A proud Filipina, a person of color, and the first person in her family to pursue veterinary medicine, Erica became a Dean's Summer Leadership Intern, working alongside Dean Grooms at Iowa State's College of Veterinary Medicine (CVM) to help improve diversity, equity and inclusion at the CVM. She currently serves as vice president for the ISU VOICE (Veterinarians as One Inclusive Community of Empowerment.), a student-run organization that seeks to increase awareness, respect and sensitivity to differences among all individuals and communities in the profession of veterinary

medicine.

Initially arriving at the CVM, Irene had her sights set on becoming a zoo/small animal veterinarian, however she has become interested in the world of diagnostic medicine, whether it be pathology, parasitology or toxicology.

As Erica's career unfolds, she "hopes to continue working in the realm of diversity, equity and inclusion and to mentor other students from similar backgrounds as hers, and hopefully encourage more students from underrepresented backgrounds to pursue a career in veterinary medicine. It is important to set an example for others who may follow in our footsteps."



Kara Valasek, Palmer, NE, DVM, Doctor of Veterinary Medicine

Kara Valasek's passion for the agricultural industry was sparked at a young age growing up as the third generation on a cow-calf feedlot. She describes herself as the little girl who followed her dad around at the sale barn, walking the catwalks to look at the cattle he'd purchased. It was the family operation that created a burning desire for her to pursue a degree in veterinary medicine, in particular the production and performance of the animal sector within the agriculture industry.

Kara's family operation thrives on its diversity and self-sufficiency. They run Charolais bulls with Sim/Angus cows. Cows are calved on their pastures and corn fields and spend the summers in pastures. Once calves are weaned, they are brought home to the family feedlot to be finished. The family harvests their own corn, silage, and hay. Most of the feed consumed by their livestock

is grown on their land.

After spending countless hours working for, shadowing, and volunteering at numerous veterinary clinics, including small animal only and equine only clinics, Kara has concluded that a mixed practice is her main interest. She plans to return to a rural area in Central Nebraska and aspires to invest in a clinic and become a partial or full practice owner.

Kara is dedicated to advocate for the production animal agriculture industry to portray to consumers the dedication and compassion that producers have for their animals. With so many consumers never experiencing how a cow-calf or feedlot operation is managed, she believes it is important to provide consumers information about how their food source is raised and dispute incorrect allegations about the industry. Kara hopes to provide mentorship for individuals interested in pursuing a career in veterinary medicine.



Irene Mas Martin, Spain, MS, Mechanical Engineering

Irene Mas Martin earned her undergraduate degree in mechanical engineering from the Universidad Carlos III de Madrid. She believes that everyone asks him or herself at some point in their life what they wish to accomplish. "Finding a way to help this world while doing what makes you fulfilled is one of the biggest personal fortunes someone can find," says Irene.

Growing up in Spain, Irene was a scouts girl. Allowed no devices such as cell phones in the wilderness, Irene enjoyed staring into the natural surroundings appreciating its beauty. It was during her time as a scout that she realized the severity of environmental issues. Volunteering during her vacations as a scouts leader in her hometown, she taught children and teenagers alternative eco-friendly life-styles, and encouraged kids to build strong morals.

During her bachelor's degree program, Irene had opportunity to study at Iowa State as an exchange student where she joined student clubs on campus such as the SolarCentric and Engineers for a Sustainable World. Irene also worked as a research assistant in Energy Systems Research where focus was placed on Anaerobic Digestion. In this department, Irene realized she had landed on the right path for her career. Returning to Iowa State for her M.S. degree, Irene is following her passion continuing her studies in renewable energies.

After graduation Irene says, "I want to do my part in this world, and not just watch without doing anything. THIS is my way of thanking everyone who helped me or taught me in my life."



Brittany Skaggs, Gainesville, Florida, DVM, Doctor of Veterinary Medicine

After graduation from the College of Veterinary Medicine at Iowa State, Brittany Skaggs will be the first doctor in her family. When she was young, she annually showed cattle at the Florida State Fair, which was her first introduction to animal agriculture. It wasn't until she participated in the Midwest Poultry Consortium at the University of Wisconsin Madison that Brittany decided to become a veterinarian in the poultry industry.

Poultry, Brittany believes, plays a major role in the human food supply chain. As a future industry veterinarian, she hopes to be able to give back to the community by taking part in safely and humanely raising poultry for consumers. Passionate about combatting world-wide hunger, Brittany volunteered to donate Thanksgiving meals to the local food bank in Ames. While volunteering, she identified a way to supply eggs to the community. Eggs laid by the college teaching layer flock were

slated for composting. Brittany persuaded her supervisor to donate the eggs instead of sending them to compost. Since then, the poultry Research Unit has worked with United Way to donate eggs to food banks around the city of Ames.

World hunger is something Brittany wants to combat. She hopes to one day be an influencer in the reduction of the world hunger number, and to eliminate hunger within her community by giving back as an industry veterinarian.



Mithila Noronha, Omaha, NE, DMV, Doctor of Veterinary Medicine

Raised in Omaha, Nebraska, Mithila Noronha is the daughter of Indian immigrant parents. Surrounded by a vibrant and diverse South Asian community full of doctors, teachers, and business executives, it is surprising Mithila chose veterinary medicine as a career. Inspired by trips to the Omaha Zoo and a new puppy, Mithila decided at a young age that veterinary medicine was the right path for her.

It is the variety of daily tasks and encounters that continues to draw Mithila into her chosen profession. As a veterinarian, Mithila is a surgeon, a dentist, an endocrinologist and more. She loves working with people and their pets, and plans to own her own veterinary practice in the future to shape a positive workplace environment supporting her various interests.

Often feeling dissonance between herself and the field of veterinary medicine—due in part to not seeing herself in others—Mithila founded a chapter of VOICE (Veterinarians as One Inclusive Community for Empowerment) at Iowa State. The organization allows for veterinary students to learn more about issues of diversity, equity, and inclusions through speakers, discussion, and community outreach activities. Mithila enjoys helping the vet school community connect with diverse voices in the profession to hear from people whom they would not normally interact.

A student representative on the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Committee, Mithila has opportunity to work with vet school faculty and staff on diversity initiatives. She also volunteers for the college's annual Martin Luther King Jr. Day of Service where she helps organize a food drive and volunteer activities. Mithila believes these experiences contribute to the veterinary profession and the community as a whole, as veterinarians should be well equipped to serve people of all backgrounds. She plans to work on diversity initiatives throughout her career to increase opportunities for underrepresented students as well as underserved clients.
